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
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The Susquehanna Symphony Orchestra was founded in 1978 by Sheldon Bair and is a community orchestra of professional and amateur volunteer musicians. The Susquehanna Symphony's home is in Harford County, Maryland, near the mouth of the Susquehanna River. The Orchestra performs a subscription series of concerts every year in addition to outdoor and chamber music concerts. The Orchestra has performed opera and ballet, as well as standard orchestral repertoire, and is known for its premieres of new works and performances of unusual repertoire. The Orchestra performed in St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York City for over 3,000 people in November 2007, and at Carnegie Hall for 2,500 people in October 2009.

#### **Music Director**

**Sheldon Bair** is the Founder and Music Director of the Susquehanna Symphony Orchestra (Maryland), a community orchestra of 100 members. He holds a Bachelor's degree from Elizabethtown College (Pennsylvania) where he studied conducting with Otis Kitchen and composition with James McVoy and Darrell Douglas, and a Master's degree from Towson University (Maryland). In addition, his post-graduate studies include classes at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. Sheldon Bair has studied conducting with Witold Rowicki in Vienna, and Marc Mostovoy, William Hudson, and Leonid Grin.



Bair teaches orchestra for the Harford County Public Schools (Maryland), is adjunct faculty for Harford Community College, is on the conducting staff for the Elizabethtown College Music Camp, and is often invited to conduct and adjudicate youth orchestras and soloists. In November 2000, Bair was bestowed the Paderewski Award for Contributions to Society and Culture at the Polish Embassy in Washington, D.C. Bair has been the guest conductor for the Flower Mound Symphony Orchestra in Dallas, Texas, and the Oklahoma City Youth Orchestra. In the fall of 2007, 93 members of the Susquehanna Symphony appeared at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, performing a program of Polish music with several choirs in front of an appreciative, standing-room-only audience. In the fall of 2009, 100 members of the Susquehanna Symphony performed on the main stage at Carnegie Hall for the same Polish impresario, performing a program of Polish works under three different conductors.

Bair, a member of ASCAP, has written a number of works for student string orchestra, two works for the Susquehanna Symphony, several arrangements for orchestra, and two works for church choir. Ensembles in Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, and Texas have performed his music. Bair's student string orchestra music is published by Howard Publications (howardpub.com). He lives in Bel Air, Maryland, with his wife Barbara (also a musician) and two of his three children (the eldest is married and lives in Virginia).

#### **About the Composer**



#### David Finko: A Russian-American Composer

In the early 1950s, the Soviet Union started active preparations for WWIII against the USA and NATO, and young talented men were pressed into service in the national army and navy. David Finko-the only son of a naval architect and the Theory of Elasticity professor—was selected to become a submarine designing engineer. He graduated from the Leningrad Institute of Naval Architecture (Diploma in Submarine Design, 1959 and the rank of lieutenant), made two arctic patrols as a crew member, and was trained at

several ship yards and at the Submarine Design Bureau in Leningrad, where he was appointed as a submarine designing engineer in 1960.

But David Finko also studied piano, violin, and music theory since childhood. He graduated from the Rimsky-Korsakov School of the Performing Arts (Diploma in Piano Performance, 1958) and from the Leningrad Conservatory (Diploma in Music Composition, 1965). He abandoned his engineering career to become a full-time composer in 1966. As a member of the Union of Soviet Composers, he wrote many works on commissions from the Soviet Ministry of Culture and noted performers, and served as an editor of the state music publishing house "Soviet Composer."

Since his emigration to the U.S.A. in 1979, David Finko has taught music at seven U.S. universities including Yale University and the Universities of Pennsylvania and Texas. He has been a U.S. citizen since 1986. David Finko has written six operas, nine concerti, three tone poems, two symphonies, and a number of chamber compositions. His music has been performed and recorded in many countries and received many awards. David has been associated with the SSO since the 1980s. "The SSO has performed many works of mine. I can drive to Bel Air with closed eyes in the middle of the night."

**Doris Reinhardt** received her Bachelor of Music degree from Oberlin College Conservatory of Music in Ohio and her Master of Music degree from The Peabody Institute of The Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. She spent a year in Salzburg, Austria as a student at the Mozarteum Academy of Performing Arts, and the following summer was invited to perform with the Mozarteum Orchestra for the Salzburg Music Festival. She has studied flute with

Robert Willoughby, Britton Johnson, and Helmut Zangerle.

Mrs. Reinhardt has taught instrumental music in Howard County, Baltimore City, and Baltimore County Public Schools. While teaching orchestra and band, she also started a steel drum program of fourth and fifth graders that performed at many schools and other venues in Maryland and Pennsylvania. In addition to playing principal flute in the Susquehanna Symphony Orchestra, Mrs. Reinhardt is active as an adjudicator of festivals and maintains a private flute studio at her home in Fallston. She is also the director of the Baltimore String Orchestra Camp held each June at the Garrison Forest School in Owings Mills.

#### **Our Guest Conductor**



Brian Folus is the founding conductor of the Harford String Orchestra (Fall 1999) and assumed the podium of the Harford Youth Orchestra starting Fall 2005. He has been a Harford County Instrumental Music teacher since 1985 and is currently teaching instrumental music at Bel Air and Joppatowne Elementary Schools in Harford County, Maryland. Mr. Folus is also on the Music Faculty of Harford Community College and the Elizabethtown College Summer Music Camp. Mr. Folus earned his Bachelor of Music Education degree in 1985 from Towson University and his

Master of Music degree from West Chester University of Pennsylvania in 1993. He has also completed an additional 30 graduate credits at the University of the Arts in Philadelphia.

Mr. Folus' arrangement of Symphony No. 1 by William Boyce has been published by Highland/Etling Publishing, the String Orchestra division of Alfred Music Publishing. He has studied conducting with Dr. Leigh M. Martinet, Mr. Raymond Moore, and Maestro Leonid Grin.

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#### **Program Notes**

#### Polka from The Bartered Bride

Bedřich Smetana (1824–1884)

Europe in the late 19th and early 20th centuries experienced the spirit of nationalism in the music of those countries outside the sphere of German, Italian, and French traditions. In what is now the Czech Republic, Smetana set out to establish a truly Czech operatic genre. In 1863–1884 he composed nine operas (the last incomplete) using the Czech language, traditional Bohemian dance forms, and authentic folk-like music. *The Bartered Bride* is a comic opera in three acts, although in its original form it had two acts with spoken dialogue. It was his second opera and premiered in May 1866. It was not immediately successful and was revised and extended in four revisions over the next four years. The 1870 version was popular and saw worldwide success. Many of the early international versions were performed in German.

The polka was added in an 1869 second revision and repositioned in a third revision, also in 1869. In the final revision, the spoken dialogue was replaced by recitative. In addition to his operas, Smetana's orchestral works include nine symphonic poems, including a cycle of six: *Má Vlast*. The best known and most performed of the six is *The Moldau*.

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#### **Program Notes (Cont'd)**

#### Concerto for Piccolo and Orchestra David Finko (b. 1936)

Mr. Finko writes, "The Concerto for Piccolo and Orchestra was written in 2006 for Lois Bliss Herbine [a Philadelphia area flutist who specializes in playing works for the piccolo]. The composer intended to utilize such qualities of the piccolo as its expressivity, poetics, tenderness, soft humor, and drama. The music represents the mentality of Slavic people....In the first movement there are two "dancing" theme-images—a light-hearted, playful one and also a stern, whining theme. This stern, whining theme becomes later a dreamy and intimate melody, like a meditation, in the solo part. There are also screaming chord progressions which represent an expression of pain, and a lullaby-like melody which appears with different "faces" in the beginning of the second movement and in a bombastic "procession" in the final movement. A dramatic development of all these theme-images culminates in the solo piccolo cadenza followed by a vigorous conclusion. The second movement is a slow aria-like love song. The piccolo sings tender, peaceful, happy duets with the oboe, clarinet, and French horn. The final movement is energetic and humorous. Some sections from previous movements appear again before a bombastic humorous episode concludes the concerto."



#### **Program Notes (Cont'd)**

Symphony No. 8 in G Major, Op. 88 Antonín Dvořák (1841–1904)

During his early years in Prague, Dvořák was employed as a violist at the National Theater. His attempts at becoming a composer were unsuccessful until, at the age of 33, a hymn for male chorus and orchestra won first prize in a competition in Vienna. The prize included a government stipend which allowed him to concentrate on composition. Over the next three years he again entered the competition and only once failed to win the prize. Brahms was one of the judges and he recommended Dvořák to his publisher, Simrock, who commissioned a set of eight "Slavonic Dances" for piano duet. Like the Brahms "Hungarian Dances," Dvořák's dances and an orchestral version were very successful. Dvořák could now devote his full energies to composing and conducting.

The 8th Symphony was, as Dvořák described, "different from the other symphonies, with individual thoughts worked out in a new way." The work has an "abundance of folk-like melody, has a relatively loose structure, is the most relaxed and lyrical of his symphonies, and is the most intensely Czech in spirit," according to Richard Wigmore. Interestingly, the symphony's main tonality is G major, but it begins in G minor and alternates between the two keys in the 1st and 3rd movements. The 2nd and 4th movements center around G major and C minor. This was unprecedented and unusual tonal structure. The symphony found immediate success.


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
