The Orchestra performs a subscription series of concerts every year in addition to outdoor and chamber music concerts. The Orchestra has performed opera and ballet, as well as standard orchestral repertoire, and is known for its premieres of new works and performances of unusual repertoire. The Orchestra performed in St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York City for over 3,000 people in November 2007, and at Carnegie Hall for 2,500 people in October 2009.

Music Director

Sheldon Bair is the Founder and Music Director of the Susquehanna Symphony Orchestra (Maryland), a community orchestra of over 90 members. He holds a Bachelor's degree from Elizabethtown College (Pennsylvania) where he studied conducting with Otis Kitchen and composition with James McVoy and Darrell Douglas, and a Master's degree from Towson University (Maryland). In addition, his postgraduate studies include classes at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. Sheldon Bair has studied conducting with Witold Rowicki in Vienna, and Marc Mostovoy, William Hudson, and Leonid Grin.



Bair teaches orchestra for the Harford County Public Schools (Maryland), is adjunct faculty for Harford Community College, is on the conducting staff for the Elizabethtown College Music Camp, and is often invited to conduct and adjudicate youth orchestras and soloists. In November 2000, Bair was bestowed the Paderewski Award for Contributions to Society and Culture at the Polish Embassy in Washington, D.C. In the fall of 2007 Bair was the guest conductor for the Flower Mound Symphony Orchestra in Dallas, Texas; in February 2011 he conducted the Oklahoma Youth Orchestra in Norman. Oklahoma; and in October 2012 he conducted the Scarborough Philharmonic in Toronto, Canada. In the fall of 2007, 93 members of the Susquehanna Symphony appeared at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, performing a program of Polish music with several choirs in front of an appreciative, standing-room-only audience. In the fall of 2009, 100 members of the Susquehanna Symphony performed on the main stage at Carnegie Hall for the same Polish impresario, performing a program of Polish works under three different conductors. Bair participated in the Sixth Malcolm Arnold Festival in Northampton, UK, in the fall of 2011 by introducing Arnold's 9th Symphony at the final Gala Concert.

Bair, a member of ASCAP, has written a number of works for student string orchestra, three works for the Susquehanna Symphony, and three works for church choir. Ensembles in Maryland, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, and Texas have performed his music. Bair's student string orchestra music is published by Howard Publications. He lives in Bel Air, Maryland, with his wife Barbara (also a musician) and two of his three children (the eldest is married and lives in Virginia).

Our Guest Performer



Chungwon Lydia Chung, pianist, is a native of Seoul, Korea and is an accomplished musician as a soloist, collaborative artist, and teacher. She made her public debut at the age of 11, performing in "Young Artist Concert" as a second prize winner of the Ihwa-KyungHyang competition, and was acclaimed by critics as "outstanding performance that can be rarely found" (The Piano, Korea). Since her

debut, winning several competitions including the Korean-American Cultural Foundation Competition in Seoul led her to numerous solo engagements such as performances with Seoul National University Orchestra and Kunpo Philharmonic Orchestra as well as solo recitals in South Korea.

Dr. Chung has achieved public recognition through concert appearances in distinguished summer festivals such as the New Millennium Piano Festival in Spain and Banff International Keyboard Festival in Canada. She was the winner of the first prize in the Baltimore Music Club Competition, and had a solo recital as a guest artist for the Performing Arts Series in Jamestown College, Harford Community College, Artscape, and for the Candlelight Concert Series at St. Croix. She also has collaborated with numerous singers and instrumentalists as a designated accompanist for the Peabody Conservatory, for the Preparatory Division of the Peabody Institute, for the Peabody Opera Outreach Program, and for the University of Maryland Baltimore County's Music Department.

Dr. Chung received her Bachelor of Music degree with Cum Laude from Seoul National University and her Master's and doctoral degrees from the Peabody Institute of the Johns Hopkins University where she studied with Boris Slutsky. Her previous teachers include Hae Sun Paik and Soo Jung Shin. She currently serves as a faculty member at The Park School of Baltimore, The Bryn Mawr School, and Harford Community College.

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Program Notes

Piano Concerto No. 23 in A Major, K. 488

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756–1791)

Spring of 1786 was a busy time for Mozart. This concerto was finished in March, around the time of the premiere of his opera, The Marriage of Figaro. He also gave three subscription concerts that spring and this concerto was probably played by Mozart himself at one of those concerts. His orchestration consisted of one flute, two clarinets, two bassoons, two horns, and strings. In Mozart's later works the wind instruments are equal to the strings, and this is also the case in this concerto. Musicologist David Steinberg describes the piece, along "with his final piano concerto, K. 595 in B flat, this one is the most chamber-musical of his mature works in the genre."

The first movement is in A major and is in sonata form. The second movement, in ternary form, is somewhat operatic in tone. It is the only movement by Mozart in F sharp minor. The third movement is a rondo characterized by movements into numerous keys and is highly spirited.

Andante Cantabile, Op. 11 Pyotr I. Tchaikovsky (1840–1893)

In 1871 Tchaikovsky composed his String Quartet No. 1 in D Major. The quartet has four movements, the second being Andante Cantabile. The melody was based on a folk song he heard at his sister's house. When the quartet was performed at a tribute concert for Leo Tolstoy, the author was said to have been brought to tears by this movement. Since the time of the composer, the Andante Cantabile movement (in B flat major) has frequently been performed in arrangements for string orchestra.

Festive Overture, Op. 96 Dmitri Shostakovich (1906–1975)

Throughout his career Shostakovich was in and out of "the dog house" with Stalin. It was probably his film scores that kept him out of prison. After Stalin's death in 1953, the composer was able to relax a little and be more daring in his writing, even bringing out earlier compositions that he had kept hidden for years. In early November of 1953, Titus Underwood writes, "Shostakovich received an unexpected request to write a short orchestral piece for the anniversary of the October Revolution of 1917. The request was not only unexpected, it came just three days before the concert when the conductor realized they lacked an opening piece for the program. Even though Shostakovich was at the 11th hour, his genius allowed him to complete this joyful masterpiece in time. He allowed a friend to watch him compose and while writing was able to talk, make jokes and compose simultaneously.... The piece was barely finished for the dress rehearsal, with ink still drying on the page. Nevertheless, there is not a hint of carelessness or poor writing to be found in this effervescent work." 10

Russian Easter Festival Overture, Op. 36

Nikolai Rimsky-Korsakov (1844–1908)

In 1888 Rimsky-Korsakov was at the height of his composing career, producing not only this work but also *Scheherazade* and *Capriccio Espanol*. The overture depicts as the title and composer explained, a moment that its listeners should have lived to appreciate: "Mass on the morning of Easter Sunday, in a large church crammed with people of all social classes, where several [priests] are celebrating the office simultaneously...the change of mood from the somber mystery of Good Friday to the uninhibited rejoicing of Easter Day...."

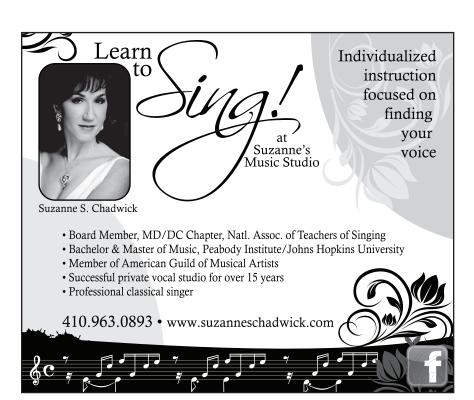


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
